Jack, I know all big cities have bad areas but what we saw was a joy. I'll send a few shots to help you remember. B.
All:

We have just returned from one of the most successful trips we've ever taken. Everything worked out beautifully and we were delighted with Philadelphia. We were immediately aware of the cleanliness of the streets. There is a virtual army of uniformed street sweepers walking around! The weather was near perfect and our hotel was four star and located right in the center of everything. We spent two days travel and seven on the ground.

On the first day we took a taxi to the Visitor's Center and took a trolley tour to get our bearings and gather maps and brochures. We were delighted to find that the excellent buses and nearly all stopped at city hall, just two blocks from our hotel and some stopped right on the corner. They run very frequently so we made good use of them. We were astonished to find that seniors ride free during from 9:30 AM to 4:30 PM and all day on the weekend, which suited our schedule very well. And we had another free ride that bears mentioning. We were at a bus stop one chilly morning and a limousine was parked nearby. The driver came over and asked if we would like to wait in the limousine. When he found out our destination he said that his boss was in a meeting for two hours so he drove us out to the museum! It's that kind of a city.

Our focus, as usual, was history and art and the city is a jackpot in those two categories. We spent a total of about fifteen hours during three visits to their world class Philadelphia Museum of Art and several more hours in the smaller Pennsylvania Museum of Fine Arts and excellent Rodin Museum. We visited every room in these fine museums and ate our lunches there as well.

We spent two days in and around Independence Hall where the National Park Service has done an outstanding job of preserving the buildings, displaying the artifacts and conducting tours. Everything is free, well organized and beautifully landscaped. We toured three restored colonial homes including Betsy Ross's as well as Franklin's grave site and two very old and historic churches. Among all of this are large shady parks with lovely spring flowers. We left with a new appreciation of the Park Service and our great country.

At one point we took a tour of city hall, gleaming white in the sunshine, and then went up on the imposing tower, topped by a huge statue of William Penn, for a magnificent view of the area. After that we decided to take a roundtrip ferry ride across the Delaware River to New Jersey but saw no reason to get off since Camden didn't look too inviting.

I will add to the bus trip part of the story you've already written which is great! What a tremendous amount of mind gripping and entertaining information you have provided....proof lies in the fact that Bill thoroughly enjoyed it....was interested in Mirek's pictures...said I should get copies, and was pleasantly surprised to see that Mirek had already given me 4 also....he had fun finding me.....and being a hunting fan himself, was fascinated by your efforts to get wild life for food :-)

Now: BUS TRIP: Re the bit about my 45.5 hours on the bus....that wasn't the whole trip! It started from my home in Noranda, Quebec (400 miles north of Montreal). From there I traveled by train overnight to Toronto (about twelve hours), then took a Greyhound Scenicruiser bus straight through to Tallahassee (therein lay the 45.5 hours on the bus)....I became most adept at grabbing the front row seat on the right of the elevated section so that I could see out all around me....at every stop, I piled my sweater, jacket, books on the available aisle half of my seat...leaned against the window and feigned sleep. Never once did anyone disturb me to ask if I'd share the seat! During that long bus ride, I went through 6 or 7 different bus drivers.

I was once treated to a trip by train, which I much preferred, all the way from Noranda to Tallahassee. There was small problem. My train ride ended in Thomasville, Georgia at something like 4 AM. Oh well, there must be a bus to Tallahassee, I surmised. I never found out. When I made my enquiry of the train stations ticket agent, she gave my question some thought, and responded, "The mailman will be leaving soon for Tallahassee. I am sure he will take you there." And so it was. He and I had a pleasant trip, chatting all the way. Upon reaching Tally, he insisted on taking me straight to my dorm, Florida Hall. On top of that, he waited outside in his truck to make sure that I got in safely. Southern hospitality reigned supreme!

I promptly, though exhausted, showered and put on fresh clothes. I grabbed my books and made it to my early morning class on time. That professor took one look at me and decided, I assume, that I looked terrible. Upon asking why I was so pale and dragging, I explained. He sent me packing back to the dorm, merely asking me to make up the work and to hand it in the following class. There is another example of Southern generosity. No wonder I kept raving to those at home about how wonderful life at FSU was. To this day, I feel the same about and in my "other life".

Use that vignette if you like, anytime. As for the trip to the National AAU in Chicago in 1957, I can write about that too, if you wish. I do think that I described that in my own "history".....(yikes...never considered myself as "history").....but if you want it for a newsletter which may reach more people, then I'll write another for you if you like....just let me know.

As for being "history", it has happened to me once before.....upon applying to teach at ECS, I was asked to provide both university and high school transcripts of my grades. The first was easy. The latter was another question. My records from Noranda High School had been forwarded to the Provincial Department of Education in Quebec City. I wrote to the appropriate department, and got nowhere. My next move was to drive to Quebec City, look those concerned in the eye, and emphasize that I needed these records. The jolt occurred when I was informed that they could be retrieved from the "archives". Woe was I to learn that, I had already been relegated to such a category. The trip in person did, at least, get me a copy of those grades. Once again, I succumbed to a reluctant resignation to the facts of life. Bill & Carol Beavers 57-61/69-70 Statue Project Chairman email to the statue committee "Thanks to the vision, politicking, challenges, and efforts of Mike, Jack, Ed, Barbara, Jim and others we have a goal and purpose to our group other than annual reunions. I was surprised and impressed by the magnitude of what those in attendance at the 2007 reunion thought they could give financially to the statue or memorial project. Here are a few thoughts and suggestions going forward to build upon the \$25,000 already committed:

We need to actually put some \$ in the account FSU will set up with clear steps on how the money contributed could be returned if the plan is aborted in its early stages.

We need to poll the non-attending gymnastics alumni and newsletter recipients on what they might be willing to contribute.

I or the committee needs a list of potential outside donors such as wealthy individuals who may have some connection to the sport, or are personal friends of anyone in the group.

We also need to build a list of potential business or corporate donors. I would use caution in approaching any corporation on your own at this point for the following reason:

I was involved in several large projects during my years at Ga. Tech that required large chunks of money from corporate donors. Our Development Office probably operates in a similar fashion to FSU's and did not appreciate anyone independently approaching a corporation for donations for any campus project. The development staff cultivates relationships with large corporations and may be simultaneously working with them on other and probably bigger projects. We may squash a big donation to FSU by "pestering" them for relatively small donations. I feel any approach to a corporation should have the blessing of the FSU Development Office before we make a pitch. In fact, perhaps the development office would approach corporate donors on our behalf once we have actually donated money toward the project.

This brings up another point some of us talked about at the reunion; what would a corporate donor want in return for a large

donation in terms of recognition/advertising??? Would we want the RJ Reynolds or the Halliburton memorial gymnastics statue?

Worse yet, would we want a "that was easy" button on our plaque?

I'm sure the FSU Development people would have much experience in this arena, and that if a further reason for them to approach and negotiate with potential corporate contributors

We still need your suggestions and need to build a list. If you have personal contacts in the corporate world or just have some ideas of corporations we should approach, send them to us.

Lastly, perhaps we can use the relatively new Alumni Directory to locate Gymkana participants for possible contributions via mail. I do not know if the Alumni Association would have a problem with this and they probably should be asked to approve such a solicitation. Of course the alternative is to go ahead and then apologize! On this project, perhaps we can build an alphabetical list from old Gymkana programs as a first step.

Let me or anyone on the Statue Committee hear from you on any of this. Your thoughts, volunteerism and money will always be appreciated! bill" [I emailed a list that I had compiled of every gymnast Gymkana members, Tots et al.
